EDUCATORS' SUMMARY OF MONTHLY REPORTS & RELEVANT TRAININGS, MEETINGS & PROGRAMS

AREA 14 EXTENSION DIRECTOR UPDATE

Gellings updated the Committee on the search for the Area 14 AED position. There were 18 applicants that went through paper screening. Preliminary video interviews were held on Monday, May 13 and six were selected, but one dropped out. Final interviews will be Thursday, May 30 in Green Lake with three candidates.

BUDGET 136 FEE STRUCTURE

Gellings received an email from Matt Hanson, Assistant Dean in Southern Areas of Extension, regarding the Budget 136 Fee Structure. The \$10,000 discount will not be removed for the next budget year. The Governor increased the Education Budget, including an increase for Extension. If this budget is approved, it is a possibility the \$10,000 discount will be permanent. Extension implemented a single educator rate, eliminating differences in the flat fee per educator. The 2020 budget should see a decrease of \$1,486.

SUMMER INTERN UPDATE

Gellings reported the Summer Intern will focus on youth programming. Applications closed and interviews are tentatively taking place on Wednesday, May 22. They will be working approximately 360 hours (early June-end of July).

Berlin: Summer reading is upon us! Beginning June 10, patrons can stop in at the library to register for Berlin Public Library's 2019 Summer Reading Program, "A Universe of Stories!" Kids and teens can log their reading hours for the chance to win some fabulous prizes, including a ukulele, an Amazon Echo Dot, local gift cards, or even free family passes to this year's EAA AirVenture Oshkosh! Each child's first completed reading card comes with a free book! Summer reading is for adults too! For each book read this summer, adults will also receive an entry into the drawing of a prize of their choice. Our official summer reading kickoff is June 13—on this date, our prize wheel will come out and raffle prizes will be on display.

Patrons suggested, we listened! Beginning this month, we are adding an additional book discussion for general fiction that will meet on the 2nd Wednesday evening of each month. We will be continuing our Mystery Book Discussion on the 3rd Monday afternoon, as well. We are excited to reach out to new readers interested in other genres.

One program we are really looking forward to is UFO Wisconsin – Watch the Sky. This program fits into our Summer Reading theme and will be sure to be a hit. If you would like to attend, mark Wednesday, June 19 at 6pm on your calendar. Everyone is welcome to this free, exciting event!

We are looking forward to the busy summer months with the excitement of visitors, families and patrons of all ages. We have lots of exciting programs planned and many incentives to keep everyone reading and coming to the library all summer long!

Green Lake: The big news this month is that we have a new library director – Christina Lyon takes over and we are delighted.

There is so much going on at the library this month that my scheduling calendar doesn't have any room left to write down the number of people who attend. THAT'S busy!

To give you a taste of what we have on offer: an author visit and an acting class, concerts and book sales, ice cream and family history, primates and pollinators, dinosaurs and their descendants – wild birds, maker mornings and summer STEM. We also have a very special celebration of 25 years on Hill Street on Sunday afternoon, June 23. Kingston: We have a new display at the library "Travel the World Through Books" which features books on places to visit here in WI and abroad. Come in and pick a place you might want to visit and find a book on the area. The display will be up through the month of June. Happy Travels!

We will be starting Tai Chi classes on Tuesday, June 11th at 5:15pm in the library reading room. Feeling stressed? Aches and pains? Swollen joints? Come learn Tai Chi, a slow-motion exercise to help you feel good. Our instructor, Jan Saecker, learned the long form of Tai Chi, Yang, from written descriptions, and then practiced it in Philadelphia with two people who had just returned from China, where they had studied the Yang form. Tai Chi, around for about 2000 years, has been the subject of over 500 scientific studies in the last half century. A review published in the Canadian Family Physician found that Tai Chi helps ease many health problems--obstructive pulmonary disease, dementia, depression, osteoarthritis, and Parkinson's. Think you are too old, too out of shape, etc. to do this? Think again. Jan Saecker is 83 and says it is fun, and you will feel great when class is done. And once you learn the moves you can do Tai Chi anytime, anywhere! Hope to see you there!

Markesan: It's going to be a busy, fun month at the Markesan Library with a school visit to promote the Summer Reading program on June 6th, a book and bake sale during June Dairy Days on June 7,8 and "Winne the Fox" making an appearance at the June Dairy Days to promote libraries at the parade. Then our Summer Reading program kicks off on June 10th running through July 31st. A raffle style reading incentive program will take place with kids and adults reading to earn chances at prizes. All children who complete their first reading raffle card (reading for 2 hours) will earn a free book. Area businesses were contacted and helped to fund the program along with other donated funds. Reading with Purdy will be our first summer reading event for the month. Purdy is a service dog trained to be read to, making it fun for kids to read without judgement. Other events for the month include a magician and a rocket building day. Cooperation with the elementary school will also continue with school visits schedule weekly during summer school starting June 19th. For adults, a movie musical showing of Mama Mia will take place on Tuesday, June 11th in cooperation with the Markesan Resident Home. Then, an Art Party will be held on Tuesday June 25th. Winnefox Library System, on behalf of the public libraries in Green Lake County, contracts with the county to reimburse those libraries for services to county residents who do not live in the Cities of Berlin, Green Lake, Markesan, Princeton, the Village of Kingston, or the Town of Brooklyn: areas that have not established a municipal library.

With a goal of providing high-quality library service to all county residents, the contract and funding formula is founded on these principles:

1. Libraries should be adequately reimbursed for providing services to county residents living outside the library-establishing municipalities
2. Library support should be fairly distributed among county residents

Under the terms of the 2017 - 2021 agreement between Green Lake County and Winnefox Library System the directors of the public libraries in Green Lake County are directed to submit a reimbursement request formulated according to the following methodology:

- a) Using the latest Annual Reports filed with the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI), the public libraries in Green Lake County shall determine what percentage of the previous year's total circulation is to residents of Green Lake County residing outside of the municipalities which maintain libraries (county rural residents).

Of the 212,648 items checked out by the libraries in 2018, 49,683 or 23% were checked out by rural residents.

- b) The percentage of circulation to county rural residents shall be multiplied by the total operational expenditures of the libraries for the prior year. This figure shall constitute the libraries' request for reimbursement for services to Green Lake County rural residents.

The combined 2018 operational expenditures for the five county libraries was \$955,504. This is multiplied by 23% to give us \$227,506 as the amount of library resources spent serving rural residents.

This funding request uses statistics from the *preceding* year to request funding for the *next* year. Funding received in 2020 will reimburse libraries for service provided in 2018.

- c) Funding for Winnefox Cooperative Technical Services (WCTS) is then added to this figure to determine the total request.

WCTS is funded by Green Lake, Marquette, & Waushara Counties. Each county's funding is determined by a per-capita amount. For 2020 we are requesting \$61,721, or \$3.22 per person living in the county.

On behalf of the libraries in Green Lake County and using the formula specified in the Green Lake County Library Service Plan Winnefox Library System is submitting a 2020 library reimbursement and WCTS funding request of **\$289,227**.

This request does *not* include billing from libraries outside of Green Lake County. Libraries have until the end of June to submit those bills.



This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the Health & Well-Being Institute in May of 2019. During the reporting period, the educator made 56 direct educational and professional contacts.


Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

Program Planning with Prairie View Head Start, Markesan

In early May, I met with the new Family Services Coordinator at Prairie View Head Start to discuss programming options. In the past I have done a handful of family and youth programs with Prairie View Head Start but with the vacancy of the Family Services Coordinator position I haven't done a program there is over a year. I will be providing some financial programming for the families, and nutrition programming for the youth this fall. I will also be teaching the Taking Care of You (stress management) program as a professional development for staff and educational program for parents/families in January.

Community Health Action Team (CHAT) – Resilience, the Biology of Stress & the Science of Hope

Members of the Berlin CHAT through ThedaCare were able to view the documentary, Resilience, the Biology of Stress & the Science of Hope at Clay Lamberton Elementary School. Researchers have recently discovered a dangerous biological syndrome caused by abuse and neglect during childhood. Toxic stress can trigger hormones that wreak havoc on the brains and bodies of children, putting them at a greater risk for disease, homelessness, prison time, and early death. While the broader impacts of poverty worsen the risk, no segment of society is immune. The documentary also shows the beginning of a movement that is determined to fight back. Trailblazers in pediatrics, education, and social welfare are using cutting-edge science and field-tested therapies to protect children from the effects of toxic stress. The CHAT team is looking to purchase rights to the community version of the documentary to provide opportunities for community members to get involved in this movement.



Networking within UW Extension and Professional Development Opportunities

I made 72 contacts within the UW Extension system during the month of May. I continue to have a number of professional meetings scheduled with colleagues and mentors to continue to network and learn from my fellow Extension educators.

Area 14 Extension Director Interviews, Green Lake

In mid-May, I was part of the interview committee for the preliminary interviews for the Area 14 Extension Director (AED) position. We selected 6 individuals to advance to preliminary interviews from the paper screening process. One candidate withdrew prior to the interviews so we interviewed 5 candidates over Zoom web conferencing. There were 3 individuals who we selected to move to the final interviews which took place at the end of May in Green Lake. The finalist will be notified pending reference checks. We are hopeful the selected candidate will begin on July 1.

This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the Agricultural Program in May of 2019. During the reporting period, the educator made 110 direct educational and professional contacts.

Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach in the Local Community

Tri-County Produce Auction

Have been working this month on getting out to the Tri-county produce auction. My presence at the auction has proven to be an efficient use of time. I can make initial contact and build relationships with more growers and buyers at one time and location.

Farm Auctions

I attended one farm auction in the area last month. These auction events outside of the produce auction are also proving to be quite an effective way to network and build relationships with other Ag professionals and farmers from the county. I find that the auction environment helps me to gauge the mood of our farming community. Seeing what the farm items bring in price gives me a sense of either the optimism or pessimism about the future of the bidders farming enterprises. This auction was because of the ongoing sluggish prices in dairy. However there was some hope in that the young couple whose dairy cattle were being liquidated saw a brighter future in no-till and rotationally grazing beef cattle.



Golden Sands

On the 15th I attended the Golden Sands Grazing Event held here in the training room. Gene Schriefer from UWEX Monroe County was the key speaker. It was an excellent time to network with our Green Lake County Farmers and learn some more about the intricacies of rotational grazing.

Networking within UW Extension and Professional Development Opportunities

Resilient Farms and Families

On the 23rd I met with the rest of the team in Madison to hammer out the remaining details in regards to the Resilient Farms Families and Communities project. The day proved to be quite productive and our website with our resources to help farm families in distress is just about ready to launch.

Professional Development

I hosted a professional development event for employees of the DATCP Produce Safety Training program and employees of UWEX. I had 9 people including myself in attendance. I gave the group some background about the auction and then we spent the rest of our time walking the auction house floor and docks mingling with the growers and buyers. We had two specialists in attendance from the University Campus. One point of interest for them was the fact that most of the growers selling at this auction are Amish. There were many questions from our specialists about Amish beliefs and culture. In return we answered many questions related to growing for the producers.

This report briefly describes the work that was completed within the 4-H Program in May of 2019. During the reporting period, the program coordinator made 218 direct educational and professional contacts.

Educational Programming, Networking and Outreach

Watch Me Grow at Boys & Girls Club of the Tri-County Area, Berlin



On May 8, 2019 I held a 4-H session at the Boys & Girls Club of the Tri-County Area in Berlin at their *Watch Me Grow* open house. This event was for Boys & Girls Club members and their families to participate in an array of activities together. At the session I led, we explored plant science through recycling. Youth and their parents used recycled construction paper and plant seeds to create a "seed ball" which they could take home and plant in their gardens. About 40 youth and their parents participated in my session.

4-H Volunteer Orientation, Green Lake

The primary purpose of the 4-H Volunteer Orientation is to ensure the safety and well-being of all participants. The Wisconsin 4-H Youth Development Youth Protection program process includes:

- Completion of the Volunteer Application Form
- Background records check for arrest and conviction records
- Participation in a volunteer orientation session
- Completion of the 4-H Enrollment Form

4-H youth development volunteers are expected to abide by the behavior standards established by Extension/4-H, and to conduct themselves as positive role models for youth. All 4-H youth development volunteers are ultimately accountable to Extension for their 4-H related activities.

In May we welcomed three new Green Lake County 4-H Volunteers who completed the volunteer orientation.


4-H Candy Company Workshop, Green Lake



On May 22nd I led a Candy Company Workshop for youth in grades 4 through 6. Eight youth (six 4-H youth and two non-4-H members) and two 4-H adult volunteers participated in this workshop held in the Training Room. I facilitated instruction in exploring Food Science. The evening started off learning about the importance of food safety before heading into the kitchen. In the kitchen, with 4-H adult volunteer support, youth worked together in small groups to follow a lollipop recipe and learned beginner techniques of candy making. Together as a large group, the young people were encouraged to explore

their creative and artistic skills as they practiced working together as a team and communicating in a group setting to name their company, create a company logo and name their flavors of lollipops. By the end of the workshop, the "Cool Pops Candy Company" was formed featuring the lollipop flavors of Optimistic Orange, Cherrylicious and Roaring Raspberry! As young people worked together to form a company, they gained citizenships skills such as respect, planning, negotiation and critical thinking.

- **Belonging:** Youth know they are cared about by others and feel a sense of connection to others in a group setting.
 - 25% of the youth reported they felt nervous working with others in a group before the workshop started, but by the end of the workshop felt comfortable working with others.
 - 90% of youth reported they enjoyed working with and felt comfortable working with others in a group.
 - 75% of youth reported they felt they played an important role in their group.
- **Mastery:** Youth feel and believe they are capable, and experience success at solving problems and meeting challenges to develop their self-confidence.
 - 50% of youth reported they feel confident in taking the skills learned about candy making and sharing it with others at a 4-H club meeting or event.
 - 90% of youth reported they feel confident in taking the skills learned about candy making and sharing it at home with family.



Networking within Extension

Five-County 4-H Camp Planning Meeting, Green Lake

4-H Extension staff from Adams, Green Lake, Juneau, Marquette, Waushara counties collaborated on May 20 to complete the final planning and creation of the online camp counselor training curriculum for 4-H Summer Camp at Upham Woods Outdoor Learning Center in June.
